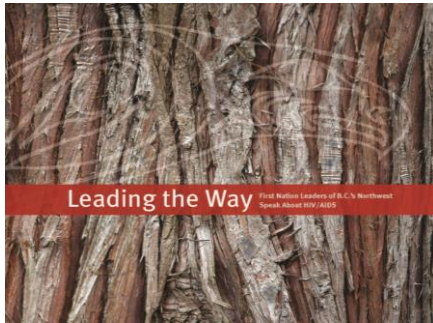

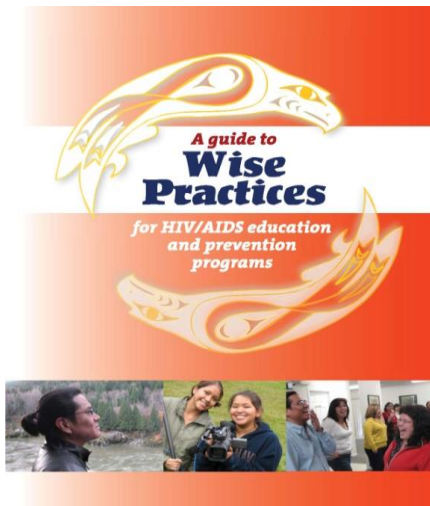
3. Honouring Our Journey

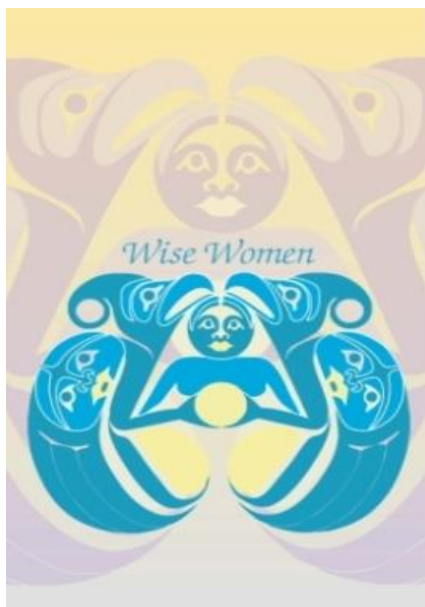
4. Honouring Our Voices

In March, five Aboriginal people from across BC gathered to share their stories about their journey with Hepatitis C. This resource captures their stories and teaching in their own words. Included among the pages of stories is information about Hep C such as how it is transmitted, signs and symptoms and prevention messages. Our hope that this resource helps create awareness of how Hep C impacts Aboriginal people, family and communities.



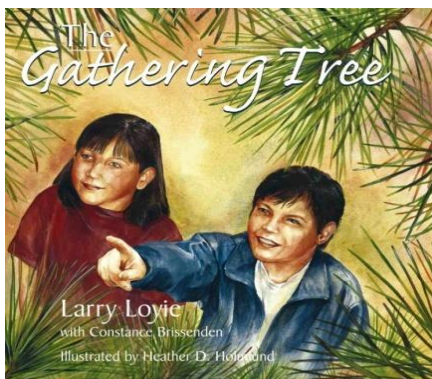
5. A Guide to Wise Practices for HIV/AIDS Education and Prevention Program

A beautifully illustrated children's book about HIV/AIDS. Written by award-winning First Nations author, Larry Loyie and co-author Constance Brissenden, this is a gentle positive story of a First Nations family facing HIV. The story reveals how knowledge brings understanding and self awareness and addresses aspects of physical, mental, and emotional health.
