# Recommended vaccines for Grade 9 students in BC



Grade 9 students are recommended to get the meningococcal and Tdap vaccines

The meningococcal quadrivalent conjugate (meningitis) and the tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis (Tdap) vaccines are recommended for grade 9 students as part of their routine immunization schedule. To get your child immunized:

- Complete the immunization consent form



## Additional vaccines available for grade 9 students

Grade 9 students may be eligible for additional vaccines if they are not up to date with other routine vaccines. These additional vaccines will also be listed on the immunization consent form. 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## Important information about consent for immunization

Please note that your consent for immunization is valid for two years unless you cancel it. It is recommended that parents or guardians and their children talk about what consent for immunization means together. Children under the age of 19, who are able to understand the benefits of getting immunized, possible side effects after receiving the immunization, and the risk of not getting immunized, can legally consent to getting the immunization or refuse it. # **Access immunization records through Health Gateway**

Health Gateway shows immunizations given at public health clinics and pharmacies in BC. It does not show immunizations given by other health care providers (i.e., family doctors or nurse practitioners) or travel clinics. Anyone 12 years of age and older can set up their own Health Gateway account to access their records. If you have records indicating your child has received additional vaccines not reflected on Health Gateway, please send these records to your local health unit or community health centre, or upload the record online. A health care professional will review and update the vaccine record(s) online.
