ADVOCATING AND EDUCATING

NEW TRAPPERS

3 day education course for new trappers as per BC Wildlife Act requirements

UPGRADES

Providing information to members to remain current for trapping related issues

NATIONAL

Support and work with partners at Fur Institute of Canada to advocate for trappers. - AIHTS testing and certification

PROVINCIAL

Advocate for trappers at provincial tables such as PHTAT. Promote sustainable management of fur bearers

PUBLIC

Public education relating to fur bearers of BC. School programs Advocate for fur bearer requirements such as habitat

OTHER ORGANIZATIONS Support other parties, such as COS, BC Wildlife Health, BCWF, GOABC, Biologists

HUMANE TRAPPING

AIHTS

International trap testing standards Traps to be certified in BC FIC – provides testing and certified traps for provinces to adopt FIC identification sheets for certified traps

BC WILDLIFE ACT

Regular intervals to check traps. Private property rules, trapline rules. Live traps versus killing traps

CAGE TRAPS

Inhumane if not properly set or monitored regularly. Factors such as weather, time of year, location. Size of trap to animal How to deal with animals caught

KILLING TRAPS

Sizes for target species Sets vary for species target Rotating Jaw traps Snares Hypoxia versus drowning

TRAPPING IN BC

TRAPLINES

BC has 2600 registered trap lines. 1800 licenses in 2021-22 season Trapline owner, or permission obtained

PRIVATE PROPERTY

Can only trap with permission. Livestock producers NOT allowed to set traps for crop or livestock protections

WILDLIFE ACT PERMITS

Permits grant permissions for out of season ie damage control. Live traps for portion of year. Release of lactating females. No translocation of some species

LIVE TRANSPORT

Not permitted in most circumstances. Permit only, not allowed with standard license.

SOLUTIONS

Value added for trapper to obtain money for samples Easily trained to collect samples needed Researchers working together to utilize sample for multiple projects Collect samples – Ie roadkill collection Live capture for translocation or collaring projects

TRAPPERS SUPPORT CONSERVATION

COMPULSORY INSP.

Animal of concern, ability to more closely monitor harvest, take data and samples COMPULSORY REPORT Now mandatory for all species. All harvest to be reported

WILDLIFE HEALTH

Trappers have better knowledge to identify sick animals





NETWORKING

QUARTERLY MAGAZINE

Glad to have article submission – ie rising issues Calls for sample collection, data collection

Trappers enjoy wildlife health reports and updates

Important for trappers when handling carcass

ANNUAL CONFERENCE, LOCAL MEETINGS

Point of contact for an area, we spend more time on trapline than average hunter or public

Local groups meet regularly, welcome guests

Annual convention, April usually – open for presentations, table tops to interact with trappers
