

Vancouver Coastal Health Authority Health Service Delivery Areas and Local Health Areas




Our story


- Evolution from four distinct health departments to a health authority
- Creation of Regional Immunization Committee in Fall 2011
 - Standardize practice in all areas
 - Support launch of new programs
 - Rotavirus
 - Varicella dose 2 at K entry (Increase in routine imms at K entry from one shot to two)

National Targets are aimed at age 7, message for K boosters: ages 4-6 years. This is inconsistent with program delivery in K.







Rubella Vaccine Coverage among Kindergarteners by CoCs Vancouver Coastal Health, 2009/2010 - 2016/2017 Academic Year



Measles Vaccine Coverage among Kindergarteners by CoCs Vancouver Coastal Health, 2009/2010 - 2016/2017 Academic Year



Conclusions

- Improved immunization rates by addressing service delivery
 - Immunize K students in schools
 - Consistency of practice via minimum service standards
- Rates improved but appear to have reached a threshold for DaPTP
 - Selective vaccine acceptance
 - Program changes require monitoring
